Let the games begin

Team-building, community support at heart of Corporate Cup

BELOIT — Employees of local companies will be demonstrating teamwork while raising money for the Stateline Family YMCA during the Sixth Annual Corporate Cup event.

Twenty-five teams have signed up to compete this year in a variety of competitive events ranging from pickleball and bowling to a scavenger hunt and T-shirt designing competition.

The Corporate Cup will kick off on Wednesday, Sept. 6 with people being challenged to complete a one-mile walk.

“They can do it anywhere. They can do it on their treadmill in their basement or they can walk in their neighborhood,” said Ann Matuska, Corporate Cup chairperson.

To earn points, participants are being asked to take a “selfie” picture of themselves on their walk. Those who send a selfie in

The next event will be the Executive Games, which are scheduled to start at 6 p.m. at the Stateline Family YMCA at

the Ironworks Campus on Friday, Sept. 8. Teams will be challenged to complete a series of quick “minute-to-win-it” games.

Throughout the next few days, teams will take part in a series of competitions at

various locations including a volleyball tournament at the Rock Bar and Grill, bowling at the Viking Lanes and a Home Run Derby at ABC Supply Stadium.

Roscoe gets set for 53rd annual Lions Fall Festival

ROSCOE — Families will be treated to rides, games, music and parades as the 53rd Annual Roscoe Lions Fall Festival kicks off in Leland Park.

The Fall Festival will be held Sept. 8 — 10 at

Leland Park, 5727 Broad St., Roscoe.

Gladys Hibbard, secretary for the Roscoe Lions, said the Fall Fest takes a lot of volunteer effort and planning, and the funds raised by the event go back into the community.

Funds from the Fall Festival support such

causes as the Juvenile Diabetes Research Fund and the St. Jude’s Foundation for Childhood Cancer Research. Also, five \$1,000 scholarships are awarded to Hononegah Community High School graduates thanks to funds raised by the event, and local food pantries

benefit from funds donated by the Lions. The Lions also traditionally support charities that address sight and hearing needs.

Also, the Lions support community events such as the annual Easter Egg Hunt and the annual Senior Turkey Dinner,

which the Lions sponsor along with the Harlem-Roscoe Fire Department.

Hibbard said thousands turn out for the festival each year and last year was an especially good year.

Elvis tribute show in Janesville will benefit VetsRoll

JANESVILLE — Tributes to Elvis Presley and other late music artists will be part of a night of classic music later this month, raising money for local veterans organization VetRoll.

“An Evening with Elvis and Friends,” will be on stage at the Janesville Performing Arts Center, 408 S. Main St., in Janesville, at 7 p.m., Saturday, Sept. 30.

It will feature world champion tribute artist Jesse Aron as both Elvis Presley and Roy Orbison, Amberley Beatty as Patsy Cline and Bobby Simkins as Conway Twitty.

All of the proceeds for the show go to benefit the VetsRoll

organization.

Bob Jesse is one half part of R and B productions, the organizer of the show. Both he and Rich Granlund decided that they should do something to fundraise for a cause in Janesville. Jesse is a Vietnam veteran who said that they should do something for veterans.

“A lot of your vets, especially Vietnam vets, and even some Korean vets, never got a thank you,” Jesse. “And VetsRoll is a great organization that allows the vets to get a thank you, so we said why not put together something for them.”

Jesse said that Elvis is beloved by many and they knew that Jesse Aron was an Elvis tribute artist and so they called him up and he was more

than willing to be a part of the show.

Aaron said anytime he can come home to Janesville he will. He said his father was a Vietnam veteran and has several friends who have served and anything he can do to give back he is always down for.

“I get to work with these guys [veterans], because these guys were always the backbone of everything that I did in Janesville,” he said. “Anything that I can do to help out, the greater Rock County area or anything like that, I’m always on board for that.”

Aron was born in Chicago. He has won numerous competitions all over the country, including the 2009 Images of the King World Championship in Memphis, Tennessee. In 2014, he was

awarded vocalist of the year at the Elvis Tribute Artist Industry Award also in Memphis, Tennessee. Aron has also received two letters of commendation from the governor.

HOW HE STARTED

He said he grew up in a middle-class family in Chicago. His family was doing whatever they could to get by, leading his parents to start their own band.

Rick Saucedo, a Chicago local, started getting a lot of attention by performing as an Elvis impersonator. Aron said that this gave his dad the idea to do an Elvis tribute in the band’s show. He said ever since, growing up listening to Elvis’ music and watching his parents perform, he knew that was something he wanted to do.

“It was so busy Friday night, and Saturday was busy too,” she said.

She said the Lions members work with the village and the Roscoe Police Department provides help with traffic and crowd control.

The Fall Festival will kick off at 5 p.m. Friday, Sept. 8 when the carnival midway opens at Leland Park. The Lions Cafe also

will open at 5 p.m., serving hot dogs, hamburgers and pork chop sandwiches each day. Music will begin on the main stage at 6 p.m. featuring OGMC with Greg and Kevin.

On Saturday, Sept. 9, the Kiddie Costume Parade will begin at 10 a.m. at Leland Park. Children dressed as princesses, superheroes and other characters will march around the park in what has become a favorite part of the festival.

The carnival midway

will open at noon. From noon — 4 p.m., karaoke with Johnny West and friends will be at the main stage and all proceeds will go to VetsRoll. Dead Man’s Hand will perform from 6 — 10 p.m. on the main stage.

On Sunday, Sept. 10, the Roscoe United Methodist Men will host the annual Breakfast at Leland Park from 7 — 9:45 a.m. The annual Fall Festival Parade will begin at 11 a.m. on Main Street. The parade will begin at

Bridge Street and end near Main Street Square. The midway will open at Leland Park at noon. STE-REOtype will provide the music at the main stage starting at 3:30 p.m. Raffle prizes will be awarded starting at 8 p.m., including the grand prize of \$3,000.

The Corporate Cup will conclude with a Trivia Night event on Monday, Sept. 18 at the Eclipse Center. An awards ceremony also will be held following the trivia competition.

The Corporate Cup has grown in participation and popularity over the years. When the first Corporate Cup was held in 2018, there were 12 companies participating. This year, 25 companies have entered teams in the Corporate Cup.

said.
